Attendance matters, moments count

Punctuality. In each class the teacher takes a register. The attendance register is taken twice a day. If your child is late for school after the register has been closed your child is marked as late after registration. The Local Authority recognise this as an absent mark. Community Police update

The Bedlington Neighbourhood Policing Team (NPT) had been made aware of repeated incidents of Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB), including fires being set alight, in Gallagher Park, Bedlington. This is a message direct from our police colleagues:

You may be aware that over the weekend, we had a Dispersal Order in place covering the whole of the park. This Order was in effect for the maximum time period that the law allows. Police need to balance the ability of people to move freely in the area with the need to keep people safe and limit nuisance caused upon others, so considerations regarding putting a Dispersal Order in place have to be proportionate, well thought out and supported with clear evidence of an ongoing issue.

With the Order in effect and with dedicated high visibility patrols, both on foot and on bicycle, we are pleased to inform you that there were no reported incidents of ASB within the park over the weekend.

The team will continue to monitor the situation as time progresses. We will take robust action against any individuals identified as causing issue. We would urge users of the park and local residents to report any issues of ASB by:

- visiting the force website here,
- by visiting the public enquiry counter at Bedlington Police Station on Schalksmuhle Road which is open daily between 9am-5pm,
- by calling the non-emergency number '101'.

In the event of an emergency or if something is happening there and then, contact Police by calling '999'.

In the event of any fires set alight, please also contact Northumberland Fire and Rescue Service via '999' providing as detailed a location as possible (via the use of <u>What3Words</u> preferably).

Carlo Acutis Relic

Some of our RE classes took part in the live stream from St Michael's Church on Friday 28 March to witness the visit of the relic of Blessed Carlo Acutis. The students found the experience deeply powerful and moving, as they joined in prayer and reflection alongside pupils from St Michael's and St Teresa's Catholic Primary Schools. The relic is a piece of Carlo Acutis' pericardium, a part of the tissue surrounding his heart, which has been venerated across the world as a reminder of his holiness. Carlo Acutis was a young Italian teenager who used his love of technology to spread the message of the Eucharist and the beauty of the Catholic faith before his death from leukaemia at just 15 years old. He is often referred to as the first "Millennial Saint" and continues to inspire young people to live their faith with passion and courage.

Lent Fundraising

Throughout Lent, we have come together as a school community to fundraise for CAFOD as part of our almsgiving efforts. Each form class has taken on a unique fundraiser, and most have exceeded their targets. Year 10 Work Experience - 19th to 23rd May 2025

Thank you for your patience as we finalise work placements. The vast majority of students have already secured their placement. However, we still have students who have not finalised or found a placement. Any student without a work placement will be in school.

The Work Experience sign-up and management is completed through the Unifrog platform – www.unifrog.org Unifrog is an excellent tool that allows students to explore and apply for opportunities, track their progress, and ensure they meet all necessary requirements.

How Does The Placements Tool Work?

The Placements tool is essentially a series of forms that have to be filled in one after another. Each time one is completed, the person who filled in the form gets a confirmation that they've done it, and the next person who needs to fill in a form gets an email notification. When (and how) should a student add a placement? To start the process on the Placements tool, the first step is for the student to add the placement to the tool. However, before adding a placement to the placements tool, the student should first agree their placement with the employer, for example by email or over the phone. When the student is ready to add the placement, they can find the Placements tool just like any other student tool, via a tile on their homepage:

After the student fills in the 'Student initial form' to get the ball rolling, the system automatically emails the employer inviting them to fill in the 'Employer initial form'. The employer must have agreed to the placement before this is filled in.

The employer details what the placement will consist of, and confirms Risk Assessment, Health & Safety, GDPR compliance, safeguarding, and insurance.

As soon as the employer marks the Employer initial form as complete, this form is emailed to the parent / carer. The Parent/carer agrees for the placement to go ahead.

Some email tips:

All the forms are sent by email, so it's really important that everyone involved in a placement has the right email entered for them, and that everyone checks their email.

To help avoid issues:

• Unifrog shows each person involved everyone else's email addresses;


• If anyone involved says they aren't getting the automated emails that the system generates, they should check their junk folders, and add noreply@unifrog.org to their safe sender list
