## **Crime Author**

On Friday 8<sup>th</sup> March, local crime author, Trevor Wood, visited school to deliver a session on crime fiction. Trevor has written five crime fiction novels, set in Newcastle, and teaches creative writing courses across the North East.

The visit was planned as part of our World Book Day celebrations, and following up on our successful crime writing competition, held in December.

Trevor met a group of students from Year 9 – Year 13, some are in the North East Book Award reading group, others were the crime writing competition winners and the rest were sixth form literature students. Trevor delivered a very interactive session on story writing, thinking about narrative perspectives, plot development and characterisation. The students got to listen to Trevor talk about his interest in crime writing, and how he approaches writing, as well as the themes and ideas he enjoys exploring in his novels. The students were a credit to the school – listening attentively, asking questions and volunteering ideas. Trevor was delighted he came and was overwhelmed by the enthusiasm of the students he met.

Year 12 Sport students took part in the North East tournament at Touch to Twickenham at Billingham Rugby Club this Wednesday. Touch to Twickenham is a mixed gender, 8 aside, non-contact tournament that is designed to be an inclusive introduction to rugby. Our students, completely new to the game competed on the white pathway which is designed for beginners. As the day went on they grew in confidence. After losing the first two matches, they then drew the third before winning their final two matches. The team worked extremely well together and tries were scored by a wide range of students including Zack Rudd, Niamh Lamb, Aoife Howe, Brooke Ness, Ewan Ogdan and Nevaeh Barnes. As the players became more experienced they started playing some flowing rugby and Joshua Marshall, Harrison Legge, Matt Whalley, Nader Al Shaar, Zoe Robson, Grace Pringle and Lydia Appleby all contributed to the team effort to make tackles in defence and keep the ball alive in attack. Player of the Tournament was deservingly given to Pacy Timlin who didn't stop running, passed the ball well and kicked strategically. The tournament will also provide a case study example to the Y12 sport class for discussion in their Skill Acquisition and Anatomy & Physiology modules.

Students engaged in a variety of both cultural and linguistic sessions, developing their language skills and knowledge of society in other countries. The afternoon also included meeting some current fourth year students at Northumbria University and hearing them describe their exciting experiences studying languages abroad as part of their degree programme. Our sixth-form students were inspired listening to all of the wonderful opportunities gained by studying a language and some have even already begun to plan trips abroad to practise their language skills!

Mr Jones and Mrs Johnson are busy getting the Y11 students ready for their GCSE Spanish exams. The speaking exam is soon after Easter so not many weeks to go now. The students really impressed us in the mocks so we hope they will pull out all the stops in the real exam too. Vocabulary learning is a really important skill when it comes to learning a language, so the MFL department have spent some lesson time recently teaching students how to revise and how to learn their vocabulary. Flashcards are a really effective revision tool and are an easy way for you to get involved and help your child to learn their vocabulary. You never know, you might even pick up the odd word or two yourself! Watching films and TV series in a foreign language is a great way to practise listening skills. Y8 have just watched the beautiful French film 'Belle et Sébastien' whilst they have been doing their speaking exams which they have really enjoyed. If you have Netflix or other streaming platform subscriptions, you can change the settings to add subtitles in French or Spanish to anything you're watching. The MFL department are always happy to give French and Spanish film recommendations too!

We are delighted to have students studying both French and Spanish in our sixth form this year. Studying a language at A Level, is incredibly rewarding and opens doors to so many further opportunities in the future. Our students seem to be relishing the challenge and enjoying the wide range of topics that they are able to study. We hope to welcome lots of our Y11s into our A Level Spanish class next year, and we are also delighted that so many Y9 students have opted to take Spanish next year for their GCSEs. ¡Qué emocionante!
